Honoring Our Doctors National Doctors' Day

Eudora Brown Almond, the wife of a doctor in Georgia, believed her husband and other physicians deserved more recognition for their hard work and set out to make this idea a reality. The first observed Doctors' Day occurred on March 30, 1933.

Almond mailed greeting cards to all local physicians and their wives, and she put flowers on the graves of deceased doctors. The flowers were red carnations, which would later become the representative flower for the national holiday. A few other local doctors' wives even assisted Almond in preparing a celebratory luncheon so their husbands' work in healthcare could be publicly appreciated. The tradition of delivering greeting cards to physicians has continued throughout the years and is still a common way of celebrating this holiday today. The red carnation is also still popularly used to say "thank you" to doctors for their work in medicine.

Doctors' Day was unofficially celebrated for many years before it became a legal holiday. On March 30, 1958, the U.S. House of Representatives adopted a resolution that commemorates Doctors' Day and on October 30, 1990, George W. Bush signed the legislature after approval from both the House and the Senate.

In the early 1980's a dedicated group of concerned citizens gathered together to discus ways to ensure our local hospital was able to continue in perpetuity. As the story goes, a group had their first meeting in the barn on Gay and Corinne Pryor's property. Gay Pryor, with Curtis Grimes and John Kneepkens, lead the

efforts. With their leadership and innovative thinking, SNMH Foundation was incorporated in 1984 and has grown into a multi-million dollar fundraising organization with vital healthcare programs, and impactful capital improvements.

While the 80's were focused on the beginning development of an endowment and general nonprofit structure, the 90's focused on infusing capital investments into the hospital. In the

first 10 years of the Hospital Foundation a major focus was place on the development of the Outpatient Center and the Cancer Center.

The 1990's was also pivotal as the board of directors hired the first professional executive director, Pamela Comstock. It's hard to believe that in 40 years this organization has only had three Executive Directors including myself.

The early 2000's focused on strategic planning and capacity building as well as raising funds for the stateof-the-art Diagnostic Imaging Center. SNMH Foundation raised \$1.2 million for the new center that includes, MRI, CT-Scan, Women's Imaging, x-ray, and a laboratory. The lobby of the center was named by generous benefactors LaVonne and Frank Amaral whose picture and name is still there today. The Women's Imaging Center has a plaque for Muriel Gorder Stahl as her family dedicated this space in her memory with a significant gift.

These are just a few of the highlights of 40 years of Caring, 40 Years of Giving. In 2024, we will take you on a journey of stories of impact and passion for our local hospital. 



The Vital Role of the Intensive Care Unit

In the heart of our rural community lies a crucial lifeline that often goes unnoticed—the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) at Sierra Nevada Memorial Hospital. While it may not be in the spotlight, the significance of this vital facility cannot be overstated. The ICU serves as a beacon of hope and healing, playing a pivotal role in the well-being of our community.

The ICU is where life-changing moments unfold. It is where critical care is provided, where medical expertise meets unwavering dedication, and where lives are fought for and, more often than not, saved. In rural areas, the need for such specialized care is particularly acute. When emergencies strike, timely access to intensive care can be the difference between life and death.

Furthermore, a robust ICU enhances the overall appeal and reliability of our local healthcare system. It provides reassurance to residents and can even influence decisions around settling in or moving to our community. A wellequipped ICU demonstrates our commitment to comprehensive healthcare and reflects positively on our community as a whole.

We cannot overlook the financial aspect of investing in our ICU. While the initial costs can be challenging, the long-term benefits far outweigh them. A well-equipped ICU can reduce the need for costly patient transfers to distant facilities, saving both time and resources. Additionally, it can attract skilled medical professionals who are vital to the success of any healthcare institution.

As we consider the importance of our ICU, we must recognize that the support of the community is paramount. Whether through fundraising, advocacy, or community initiatives, our collective efforts can make a tangible difference. The investment in our ICU is an investment in our health and our future.

Our local ICU has ten beds and has been a central life-line to this community, especially during the pandemic and increasing flu and respiratory virus seasons we have been experiencing. Over the next few months we will be focusing our fundraising efforts on a \$300,000 investment in the ICU at Sierra Nevada Memorial Hospital. Please stand with us recognizing the indispensable role of our rural small hospital's ICU. Let us champion its significance and pledge our support to ensure it remains a beacon of hope and healing for our community.

Celebrating Crucial Milestones in Care

SNMH recently celebrated a major milestone with the ICU caregivers and the rest of the organization. Through phenomenal partnership with the medical staff, our ICU team, our Quality and Safety Team, and a special lift from Infection Preventionist Heather Scott, the hospital has now cared for patients for over 1100 consecutive days without a single one of them suffering a Central Line Associated Blood Stream Infection (CLABSI). To add to the celebration, the Chair of our Board of Directors, Stephanie Ortiz, joined in rounding on the team and sharing the great news! This milestone puts SNMH in the top 1% of hospitals in the nation for patient safety and is one of the metrics that lead to the hospital receiving an A rating from the LeapFrog Group as well as the Top Rural Hospital award.

A Healing Journey

In May of 2020, Liv and Denny Fitzpatrick moved from their home in the Eastern Sierras to Nevada City. They loved the remote beauty of the Graeagle area, but they felt that, in the event of their needing acute medical care in the future, the proximity to a renowned medical center would be practical at their ages. They found their dream home in Nevada City, a much larger community, but retaining enough forest and natural beauty to make it ideal for them.

Then, last June, Liv was diagnosed with Negative 3 Breast Cancer requiring 6 months of Chemotherapy to hopefully shrink the tumor before surgery, followed by radiation. The long journey for Liv and Denny began as they met with their extraordinary team at Sierra Nevada Memorial: Drs. Boyle, Campbell, and Hess. Liv started her weekly infusions in August at the A.T.C. (Ambulatory Treatment Center), sensitively monitored by Dr. David Campbell, her Oncologist. She is currently in the 2nd Phase of her chemotherapy treatment, scheduled to end in January 2024.

Liv feels that this disease, her second time with cancer, has in many ways been a gift in disguise. Both she and her husband have been overwhelmed by the compassion and professionalism of every person they have encountered at Sierra Nevada Memorial Hospital. They feel that the doctors-together with their caring, upbeat staff—have taken a frightening, anxiety-driven situation, and embodied what Dr. Bernie Siegel advocates in his book, Love, Medicine, & Miracle, fighting effectively for your health with a positive, loving attitude toward yourself and others.

Referring to the amazing nurses in the A.T.C., Liv says she can't express the climate of warmth and empathy that can turn a long day into a sweet, memorable experience. Consequently, when they received the call for help from the SNMH Foundation in their current fund-raising drive, Liv and Denny knew it was time to try and express the inexpressible with gratitude and love. They hope that their gift of \$5,000 to benefit the Cancer Center will motivate others to join them in recognizing the true blessing we have in this community: the incredible healing staff at SNMH.
